## Nelson Wraps Up Slate of Career Speakers for 23-24

The final Harper County Transition to Careers speaker for the school year for Attica Public Schools and Chaparral was Chris Nelson.

Nelson is the IT program instructor at Pratt Community College.

He urged those in attendance to be watchful of where they used public wi-fi. He added that using public wi-fi does not ensure that it is safe as it can easily be hacked.

Hackers create malicious apps that can siphon personal information from a device when it is downloaded or uses many apps.

Cybercriminals will also set up fake public wi-fi networks to lure and redirect people to

malicious websites where they can steal personal information.

According to Nelson, the Linux program is used daily 80 percent of the time in the Internet world. It is inexpensive for an individual to purchase a hacker computer. Linux is easy to install and works well on old and weak systems. It is easy to use a hacker computer to get into a person's banking information.

"The FBI says schools are the least protected from hackers," Nelson said.

One of the most common targets for a hacker is Chrome books. Chrome books are used for classes and are inexpensive. They also have less protection than some other types of

The day was filled with nature fun, conservation lessons, and hands on educational experiences.

The seven conservation-minded stations included water quality presented lakeside by Ronald Graber, a watershed specialist from K-State Extension. Keith Murrow, KDWP biologist presented skulls and pelts of Kansas. Bird watching, with Bonnie Giesen, had one group very excited to see a blue herring.

Harold Waldschmidt was on site to give the Buzz About Bees, which is always a crowd favorite with a taste of honey. Composting, with Mike Aldritt, got a few squeals when the worms came out.

Mockingbird Farms helped the students to create seed bombs and launchers to take home, and Brandon O'Riley and Chris Hoskinson, from NRCS, presented the Streambank trailer.

National Honor Society students from both Attica and Chaparral were on hand to lead groups back and forth from one presenter to the next, or help out at an individual station. Nature bingo was a popular game to play as students passed from one location to the next.

The day finished with the NHS high school students quizzing the kids over what they had learned throughout the day.

## OBITUARY

### ROSALEA PHYLLIS HOSTETLER

Rosalea Phyllis Hostetler died March 8, 2024, at Patterson Health Center after a gradual decline in health. She was born Nov. 21, 1936 to Ura and Della (Balmer) Hostetler, the second youngest of six children. Rosalea grew up on the family farm five miles west of Harper. She took piano lessons from Mrs. Gill who lived nearby and learned to love music from growing up in the church. She attended school at Nebo and Crystal Springs grade schools and graduated from Attica High School with the class of 1954. Later she attended the University of Kansas graduating in 1965 with a BFA in Design.

Rosalea is survived by her brother Delmar, sister in laws, Alma, Bernice and Julie, several cousins, numerous nieces and nephews. She was preceded in death by her parents, brother in law and sister, Joe and Thelma Kauffman and brothers, Lester, Albert and Dewey. Per Rosalea's wishes no memorial service was held and her body was donated to KU Medical Center.

Having lived in Los Angeles, New York City, Cincinnati and Kansas City, Rosalea had a cosmopolitan outlook that was not fully appreciated by her hometown. She wore many hats but was driven by her creativity, her yearning to preserve history and to make Harper a tourist town. These include activist, advocate, artist, author, collector, editor, event planner, friend, fundraiser, hotel proprietor, idealist, insurance sales, real estate broker, thrift store, historic preservation and visionary.

Rosalea purchased the 1883 Patterson House Hotel in 1968 for \$1,500. It became known far and wide as a "hippie haven" although many people stayed there who were not actually hippies. She wrote a book to chronicle her experience with the hotel, "Bible Belt Oasis: Rosalea's Hotel 1968 to 1978." The City of Harper chose to demolish the hotel in 2015 because of deteriorating condition and a bunch of curious onlookers were standing around "whooping and hollering." Rosalea was devastated but found the strength to carry on.

Rosalea was the invited guest of honor at a reception and book signing in New York City in recognition of her ingenuity and creativity. She secretly hid thousands of her miniature art pieces (one inch square) in various locations across the country. Some of them were discovered in the card catalog of the Los Angeles Public Library when they converted to a computerized system. Photographs of these miniature art pieces are featured in an exquisite book of art by David Bunn.

When movie producer Hugh Gross contacted Rosalea she referred him to Kingman for the filming of "After the Wizard," a sequel to the 1939 classic, "The Wizard of

Oz." It turned out to be a huge success and a movie worth watching. Dorothy and her dog, Toto, reportedly landed in Kingman and might still be found there if you know where to look.

Rosalea is perhaps best described as one-of-a-kind. She is different. She has a knack for doing things that most people never even think of doing. She innovated by making paper weavings with her loom. Over the years she had several interesting interviews with Larry Hatteberg on KAKE-TV. In 1994, she started a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, The Balmer Fund, "to preserve the history, art and culture of the prairies for future generations." She sent a treasure trove of archival material to Special Collections at Pittsburg State University which is sealed until one year after her death.

At one point she even ran for mayor because she didn't like the way things were being done in Harper. It's a safe bet that she would not have done things the same old, same old way. If she had won Harper would likely be a different city today.

In addition to all of the above Rosalea poured her heart and soul into producing and distributing a monthly periodical. "Prairie Connection," a grassroots publication connecting small communities across South Central Kansas and Northern Oklahoma, making new friends along the way. There were many contributors with personal interest stories, poetry, recipes, events, humor, etc. and of course, Rosale herself always had something to say. She designed the cardboard news stand herself from a single piece of cardboard folded multiple times. She worked tirelessly and this endeavor was the equivalent of working a full-time job without any pay. As age and health took a toll "Prairie Connection" was downsized to only a few pages issued quarterly.

Thanks to Rosalea, The Balmer Fund still owns four adjoining historic buildings on Main Street, two of which date back to the original townsite of Harper. Rosalea succeeded in getting one of these buildings listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the 1881 I.P. Campbell Building, aka Anchor Oyster Parlor, with the help of Richard Krabill, Architect, and his assistant, Dan Rouser. The other original building was the first bank to be built in early Harper.

Rosalea's work will not cease. The Balmer Fund board hopes to continue Rosalea's legacy of historic preservation by restoring the two original buildings to usefulness and making repairs to the interior and to the facade and displaying some type of signage in her memory.

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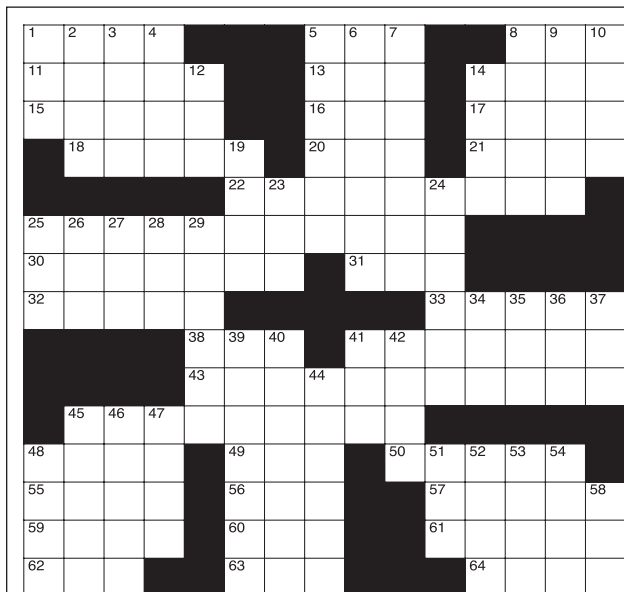
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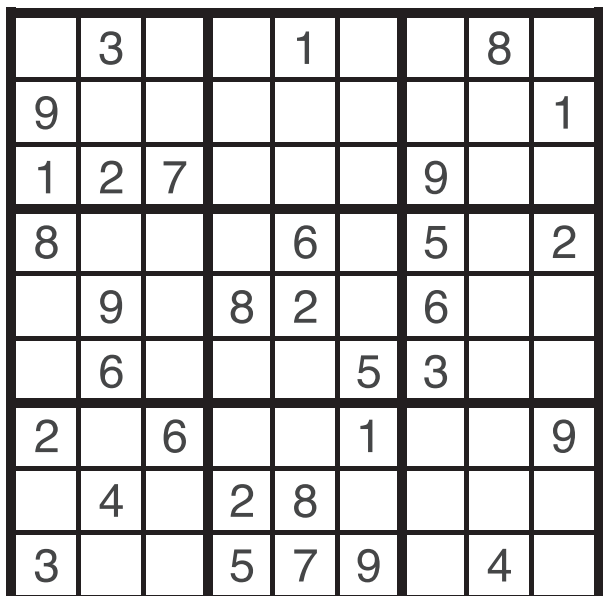

computers.

He added that Meta, medical facilities and financial institutions are common targets as well for hacking.

Any hacker is hoping to find personal information, such as social security numbers or access to credit cards. A hacker can capture weaker passwords and records of an individual then send scam demands for funds or information.

Because of the high demand for all people that need information, there is

a demand for security and networking. This demand for security opens the opportunity for students to earn IT certification.

The IT certification shows a person's competency in a specific field of information technology.

"A certification proves you know something and it can align that a person is interested and willing to learn in the job they are pursuing," Nelson said.

Nelson encouraged students that enjoy puzzles and problem solving to pursue a certification. It is a way to get a start in the information technology age.
