Southern Pioneer to Expand Its Trustees Board

PRESS RELEASE

Southern Pioneer Electric Company (Southern Pioneer) recently announced the expansion of its board of directors to include four additional at-large seats.

The addition of new board seats follows the company's recent transition to self-regulated status after the passing of Senate Bill 348 by the Kansas Legislature earlier this year. These additional four seats will be selected through an application and interview process.

Consumers interested in applying must hold primary residence in Southern Pioneer's service territory and meet all required qualifications outlined on the company's website. Application packets are available online or by reaching out to Southern Pioneer's administrative team.

Complete packet must include: a completed application form; a biography – 500 word limit – submitted digitally at southernpioneer.net, or typed, printed and included with the submission of the completed packet; a photo – headshot – submitted digitally; resume including relevant experience and information outlining the candidate's expertise; and a statement of application – 250 word limit – expressing the candidate's interest in serving on the Southern Pioneer Board of Directors.

Application materials may be submitted to Southern Pioneer by mail, in person or online – instructions at southernpioneer.net. Mailed submissions may be addressed to: Southern Pioneer Electric Company, Attn: Board Nomination, PO Box 430, Ulysses, KS 67880. In-person submissions may be returned to the company's Liberal office, located at 1490 General Welch Blvd. or the Medicine Lodge office, located at 3997 NE Well Rd. or the corporate office in Ulysses, located at 1850 W. Oklahoma Ave. Applications open Aug. 15 and must be received no later than 5 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 30.

Following the application period, the current Board of Directors will review submissions and select candidates to interview. Questions regarding the Southern Pioneer Board of Directors or application process may be directed to the company's corporate office by calling

Funfest is making its way back to Protection this year.

The first event starts Friday, Aug. 28 in the Protection City Park with an ice cream social. It starts at 5:30 p.m. Bring a chair to sit and visit.

From 6 p.m. to 11 p.m., is the cornhole tournament with cash prizes for the winners. Leland Olkjer is in charge of the event. You can be a seasoned player or just toss for fun.

While that is going on, Chelsea Bean will have "Kidzone Stations" at the park.

A parade will start, at 10 a.m., at the north end of the city park and will travel to Protection Valley Manor then turns around and heads back on Broadway to the park. Entry setup will start at 9 a.m. Jonathan Webster, Monroe and Gean are in charge of the parade.

Breakfast, of donuts, coffee, water, juice and community church, begins the day at 10 a.m. in the city park with new South Central High School Principal Tyler Bates as speaker, while Delaney provides the music and Luke Baker offers a prayer. There will be a container(s) where checks written can be left made out to Funfest, track fund, First Baptist Church, First Christian Church, Grace Bible Church or Protection Methodist Church. A drink vendor will also be at the park.

A slosh ball tournament will begin at 11 a.m. at the ballfield west of the park and swimming pool. This is softball with a twist. Team players must be 18 years or older and must sign a consent form for liability reasons. Three food

USD 300 Welcomes New Faces; Familiar Faces With New Roles This Year

Tyler Bates is stepping into a new role at USD 300 this school year, taking the helm as the district's high school principal.

For Bates, however, the school district isn't an entirely new place. He grew up in Protection and attended school in the district through his freshman year before moving to Oklahoma as a sophomore. Now, after five years in education, Bates is returning to the district – this time as a principal.

"I loved my time growing up here, and I grew up in Protection, so I'm just really excited I'm back," Bates said.

Bates said his decision to pursue education was rooted in a desire to

make a difference in the lives of students.

This year will mark his first year as a principal, bringing a new set of responsibilities and opportunities to the career he began as a teacher.

One of his biggest priorities is getting to know the people who make up the school and community.

"I'm just really excited about meeting all the new students and staff and community members and building those relationships," Bates said.

While his role will put him in contact with students throughout the school, Bates said he hopes to model the importance of hard work, toughness and dedication.

Those values are part of what he wants students to carry with them

beyond their time in school.

"I hope they just learn the value of hard work and toughness and dedication," he said.

Bates also brings a connection to the district that students may not expect. As a student, he was heavily involved in music and learned to play four different instruments. His favorite subject was history, another reflection of the interests he developed during his own school years.

Although stepping into the principal's office represents a significant change from his years as a teacher, Bates said his focus remains on creating an environment where students can succeed.

His goal for his first year is to help make the school a place where students feel safe, supported and

able to learn.

"I want my goal to be for this school to be a school where everybody feels safe, where they feel like they can learn, and a positive environment," Bates said.

And when it comes to the advice he wants to give students as they begin the new school year, Bates keeps it simple: Treat others as they want to be treated.

For Bates, the new position represents both a new chapter in his career and a return to a community that was part of his own childhood. This time, he comes back not as a student, but as one of the people responsible for helping shape the school experience of the students who follow.

Enrollment increases

Preliminary enrollment figures taken the first day of school at the elementary, middle and high school show the student head count up by 14 students in USD 300.

Those first day enrollment figures showed 352 pupils enrolled in the district, compared to 338 a year ago.

That boost in enrollment comes entirely from the elementary and middle school levels.

The number enrolled in

the lower 10 grades—preschool through eighth grade—this year is 263. That is an increase of 14 students at South Central Elementary/Middle School in Protection over last year’s count of 249.

South Central High School is “holding its own” this year, with a first-day count identical to that of last year. So far 89 students are enrolled this year in the four grades at SCHS in Coldwater. That is the exact number turned in for the first day at the high school a year ago.

While the amount of state aid which will be given to the district is based on the number of students, the first-day numbers will not be the ones used in calculating that state funding.

State funding will be based on the “final” enrollment count which is taken on September 20 each year.

I was totally shocked that anyone could care about me. I was elated! She made me cry.

Both of those wonderful teachers have been gone for many years. But here I am writing about them 75 years later—two special teachers who gave me a major boost when I needed it. That must have been about 1936 or 1937.

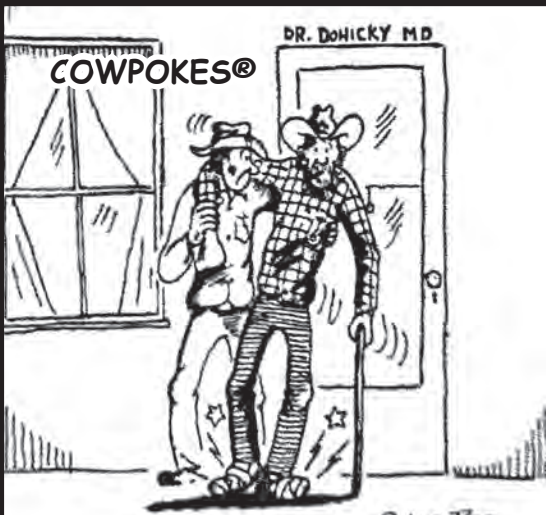
I just want to tell teachers everywhere that they are so important to our children. Kids need affection and direction. They need guidance that you can give them. Sadly, some youngsters feel they are unloved.

I went to three different high schools in three different states: Fort Worth, Texas; Boulder, Colorado; and Southgate, California. Because I spent some time in the military during World War II, it took me 10 years to get through high school. I finally earned my diploma in 1950 through a G.E.D. test.

I went on to attend Colorado University in Boulder. I didn’t graduate—but started writing full-time for newspapers, which I loved.

Back in the Older Days

Coldwater news from earlier days

130 YEARS AGO
From Aug. 22, 1896 Star
August, so far, has been a dry month.

Topeka, Kan., Aug. 11—The population of Kansas as returned by township assessors through the county clerks, has been tabulated by the State Board of Agriculture, and the total is 1,336,659, or a net increase, during the past year of 1,925.

Forty-five counties have gained 27,221, the smallest gain being four, in Stevens, and the largest 3,217, in Cherokee. Sixty counties lost 25,296, the smallest being one, to Phillips, and the greatest 2,234 in Cowley.

U.S. Marshal Neeley is gaining a reputation here for holding on to fees. About two months ago the fees in the case of Comanche county vs. John Q. Leonard, were turned in by the county to Mr. Neeley, but he has never got around yet to settle with the persons who have fees in this county, through the boys are kicking like “bay steers.” He probably don’t know that money can be loaned here at 2 per cent a month, as well as at Topeka.

At the republican state convention last week, W.V. Jackson was chosen state central committeeman from this district.

The teachers’ examination for this quarter will be held in the city school building in Coldwater, Friday and Saturday, August 21 and 22, commencing each day at 8 o’clock a.m.

The Coldwater school board met Friday of last week and selected the teachers for the ensuing school year as follows:

Principal of the high school department, Prof. Jay Botts, of this city; intermediate department, Mrs. B.F. Donnell, of Ashland; primary department, Miss Ella S. Doig, of this city.

The schools will open September 7. The principal and the teacher in the intermediate department are new teachers in our schools.

120 YEARS AGO
From Aug. 17, 1906 Star
George Briggs has the thanks of the STAR for as fine a basket of peaches as we have seen this year. They are certainly fine.

J.H. Coffin arrived last week from Kiowa and has accepted a position in A.R. Schulze’s bakery and restaurant. Mr. Schulze expects soon to begin the shipping of bread to different points along the railroad.

A mass convention of the republicans of Comanche-co. will be held in Coldwater at 2 p.m. on Saturday, September 1, 1906, for the purpose of nominating a county ticket and a candidate for representative.

The Coldwater school board has employed Miss Flossie Rosell as teacher in the grammar grade. Miss Sequist of Emporia, whom the board first employed, resigned.

Topeka, Kan. —Kansas has more banks per capita than any state in the Union except Nebraska, and only Pennsylvania and Missouri exceed the total number of banks in this state.

Dean W. Hisely of Fairmont College, Wichita, has compiled a statement showing the banking business in Kansas for ten years which has been furnished the bank commissioner. Kansas has a total of 836 banks, an average of one bank for every 1,846 persons.

Missouri has 845 banks, one for each 3,522 persons, and Pennsylvania has 1,111 banks, one for each 6,170 persons. Kansas has the same number of banks as Illinois and nearly one hundred more than New York.

110 YEARS AGO
From Aug. 18, 1916 Star
Only three more weeks of vacation for the school children.

A petition to the Coldwater city council is being circulated requesting that an election be called for the purpose of voting bonds for the construction of a municipally owned and controlled ice plant. The legal right of the city to engage in such an industry is being questioned. There is one thing sure, however, and that is that a good ice plant, under business-like management, is needed in our city.

The present summer has brought additional evidence of the fact that Coldwater needs to have a good ice plant. The local dealer has not been able to get enough ice to supply all the demand all the time.

A.E. Cleaver and F.W. Fetter, who until recently had made Dodge City their home, this week, purchased the Plummer bakery and confectionery business in this city, taking possession on Tuesday. The bakery will now be known as the “Little Ruby” bakery.

Messrs. Cleaver and Fetter are practical bakers and hustling young businessmen. Mr. Plummer had made a marked success of the business during the five years he has been here. As yet, his plans for the future have not been fully decided upon. We shall regret to have him and Mrs. Plummer leave Coldwater.

And still it threatens, almost every day, to rain a good old-fashioned rain again.

The Socialist “encampment” is being held in Protection this week. It began on Wednesday and will close on Friday. The Socialist candidate for vice president, Geo. R. Kirkpatrick, of Ohio, is the principal speaker.

100 YEARS AGO
From Aug. 20, 1926 Star
Coldwater’s old school building is now practically all torn down, and much of the debris has been hauled away. There yet remains considerable work to be done in getting the grounds cleared of all rubbish and put in good shape.

The new building now shows up much better, especially from the south. Few towns of the same size in Kansas now have better school buildings and school facilities than has Coldwater.

On Friday, August 20, and Saturday, August 21, the enrollment of the high school students in C.H.S. for the school year 1926–27 will be held at the high school building. Seniors and Juniors will enroll Friday, August 20. Sophomores and Freshmen will enroll Saturday, August 21.

The office will be kept open until 8 p.m. for those students who are working or otherwise cannot come during the day. The final book order will be compiled at this time, so it will be necessary for the student to inform us of what new books he/she will need for the year. Every prospective student is urged to be present on one of the above designated days

in order to allow a uniform start on September 6.

All who expect to attend CHS during the ensuing term should read Supt. Crosswhite’s notice in regard to enrollment on either Friday or Saturday of this week.

A good shower of rain on Wednesday night—the fourth within a week—helped to keep things pretty well moistened in this part of the state.

The late rains will bring up the volunteer wheat in a hurry. There is still need for getting rid of the volunteer wheat, as nearly as possible, in order that damage from the Hessian fly may be averted. October 2 is considered the fly-free date.

90 YEARS AGO
From Aug. 21, 1936 Star
Two weeks until school begins.

Enrollment will be held before school begins this year. This will give you an opportunity to secure your school books and supplies by the time school opens, which will be September 7.

The seniors may enroll on Friday morning, August 27 from 9 until 12 o’clock; the juniors Friday afternoon from 1 until 4 o’clock. The sophomores and freshmen may enroll on Saturday, August 28 from 9 until 4 o’clock.

If it is impossible for you to enroll at the time specified, try to see us before that date rather than after. Lockers may be secured at time of enrollment.

We wish to call attention to the extension work that is still going on under Mrs. R.C. Korff. If anyone wishes to take any of this work feel free to do so as credit is not required but if anyone wants credit we must have at least five enrolled in the class. Mrs. Korff will start these courses any time so if you are interested in this type of study call or see Mrs. R.C. Korff, Coldwater.

During the past week some real estate transfers have been made in Coldwater. Asa Hooper has bought the house in which Oscar Carter and family have been living and Donnie King has purchased the Meers residence property which has been occupied by Charles Scholle and family.

The Kings and Hoopers plan to move to Coldwater so their children may attend school. There is a strong demand for houses in Coldwater. At least 10 modern residences are needed. There are few if any empty houses in town and a number of houses are occupied by two families.

Comanche County has been designated as a drouth county and drouth rates on shipments of roughage to this county, and rates on livestock being shipped out for feeding are now in effect. The necessary drouth certificates may be secured at the Farm Bureau office.

80 YEARS AGO
From Aug. 23, 1946 Star
Billy Hilt, member of the Coldwater Chapter of Future Farmers of America, has been named as one of the 13 high school graduates in Kansas to be awarded a \$150 [worth over \$2,500 in today’s dollars] Sears Roebuck Foundation scholarship in Agriculture at Kansas State College, Manhattan, L.E. Melia, local adviser of the Coldwater FFA Chapter, announced today.

Hilt, who has had four years of Vocational Agri-

culture, is a State Farmer, and has always taken an active part in Future Farmer activities. This spring he was fifth high individual in crops judging at the 23rd annual high school vocational agriculture and farm mechanics contests held at Kansas State College, Manhattan.

There have been no cases of polio this summer among Comanche County children, although one case, which turned out to be fatal, occurred while a youth from out of the county was visiting at the Frank Lindsay home southwest of Coldwater.

As a precautionary measure the swimming pools in both Protection and Coldwater have been closed. County Health Officer R.A.J. Shelley, asks that parents see that their children do not become exhausted or be subject to a quick change in temperature.

School will begin in Coldwater on Monday, September 2, and other schools will begin on schedule, unless an outbreak occurs. Comanche County appears to be in one of the zones which, thus far, at least, is free of polio. If signs of a sudden cold or fever occur, call your doctor at once.

The Coldwater schools will open on Monday, September 2, barring any outbreak of disease. Classes will convene for one-half day on Monday, at which time assignments will be made. The high school will convene at 8:30 a.m. and the grades at 9 a.m. and both will dismiss at 12 o’clock.

The regular schedule will be in force beginning on Tuesday. School will take up to 1 p.m. and the school will dismiss at 3:45 with the grade pupils being released at 4 p.m. according to Supt. Troy L. Lindsay.

Sun City’s baseball team trounced Coldwater Sunday to the tune of 22 to 11. The home team just couldn’t do anything right. Coldwater goes to Greensburg Thursday to oppose Greensburg at the Kiowa County Fair, and on September 2 the home team is entered in the Medicine Lodge tournament.

70 YEARS AGO
From Aug. 24, 1956 Star
On Monday of this week, Mr. Woodward, representing the Safety Department of the Kansas State Highway Commission, delivered to Sheriff Phillip Hackney, a large bronze plaque mounted on a walnut board, with the following words inscribed on the plaque below the Kansas Safety emblem: “COMANCHE Winner of County First Award, Class E, Kansas Traffic Safety Council, 1955.”

The plaque is now on display in L.G. Whitzel’s office window and will later be hung in the sheriff’s office as a permanent possession of the county.

Gary Boley, Charles Timmons and Jerry Young spent a week recently at Dodge City attending a Standard Oil Co. training school. The training program included products and servicing autos, also many special services necessary for service station operation.

For a number of years Jacob Reiss Jr. of Coldwater has been a prime advocate and booster for Angus cattle and has a fine herd of his own. This year he awarded \$5 [worth just over \$60 now] in cash to each Angus exhibition at the Comanche County 4-H Fair.

repaired. Until then, the Road and Bridge Department will use the courthouse mower for mowing within the city limits.

Vehicle Repairs Discussed

A windshield replacement was quoted at \$414.60, while tires were estimated at \$1,056.

sioners to consider exchanging vehicles between the Appraiser's Office and Sheriff's Office. Under the proposal, the Chevrolet Traverse would go to the Sheriff's Office and the Ram pickup would go to the Appraiser's Office, with no money exchanged between the departments.

Commissioners said the vehicles' values would need to be determined before making a decision.

The commission also

Lance Longhorn

USD 300 has welcomed Lance Longhorn as its new technology director for the 2026-27 school year.

Longhorn comes to the district with a background in technology that began while he was still in high school, where he took networking and computer repair classes at a vocational technology center.

After working in larger school districts, Longhorn said he was interested in experiencing a smaller district environment.

"I kind of want to try my hand at a smaller set," Longhorn said.

As technology director, Longhorn will work behind the scenes to help ensure students and staff have the technology support they need. One of his goals during his first year is to build on the technology already in place while making sure users can get help when problems arise.

"My goal is to increase the technology needs of the district, ensuring that the users and the staff are in capable hands of getting their technology questions or problems solved," he said.

Longhorn said he is also looking forward to getting to know the staff and students and learning how the school environment functions within the district.

Outside of work, Longhorn enjoys video games and music. He is also ranked in the speedrunning community for a horror survival video game.

As students begin the new school year, Longhorn offered a simple piece of advice: "Show up to class, pay attention and do your best."

Alondra Rivero

Alondra Rivero is returning to familiar hallways this school year, but this time, she will be standing at the front of the classroom.

A graduate of the school, Rivero has joined the staff as the new high school math teacher. She will teach algebra I, geometry, algebra II and advanced math.

While becoming a teacher was not always part of her long-term plan, Rivero said her decision came naturally after years of working with students.

"Honestly, it was just kind of a last-minute decision on my part," Rivero said. "But I've always loved being around students and helping them get wherever they want to go."

Rivero has tutored high school students since she was 19 and said one of the things she enjoys most is watching students finally understand something they have been struggling with.

"I've always really liked seeing them have a little light bulb moment when they actually finally get something," she said.

Those moments are something Rivero is especially looking forward to as she begins the school year. She understands that math can be one of the more challenging subjects for students and knows that not every concept will come easily.

Still, she hopes to help students experience those moments when everything finally begins to make sense.

"I'm most excited for them to be able to get those light bulb moments," Rivero said.

Rivero said her decision to teach at her alma mater was also influenced by her connection to the school and its students. Her sister is currently a student there, and Rivero said she had conversations with a former school administrator about the difficulty of finding someone to teach math in the district.

There had been discussion about students potentially taking math classes online, something Rivero said she did not want to see happen.

With her experience tutoring students, Rivero said she has seen some of the challenges students can face with online learning and wanted to help ensure they had an in-person teacher.

Although her job will involve teaching the state-required math curriculum, Rivero hopes her students take away more than equations and formulas.

"I want them to get out of the classes critical-thinking skills, problem-solving, being responsible, respectful and just becoming

functioning members of society," she said.

Rivero said she expects students may not immediately appreciate all of her classroom rules.

"I think the kids are going to hate me and my rules the first couple months," she said with a laugh. "I feel like they're going to appreciate it. They're going to see that it's necessary."

A bilingual teacher, Rivero said students may also be surprised to learn that she dreams in both languages.

She said the language she thinks and dreams in often depends on who she is communicating with.

While math will now fill much of her classroom time, Rivero said physics was one of her favorite subjects when she was a student. Her interest in the subject continued into college, where she learned even more about it.

As she begins her first year teaching at her former school, Rivero said she wants students to remember that they do not have to know everything.

Her advice to students for the upcoming school year is simple: "It is okay to not learn everything – and don't act a fool."

Abigail Robles

For Abigail Robles, becoming a teacher is about giving students the same kind of guidance she once received from one of her own teachers.

Robles is joining the high school staff this year as an English teacher, beginning her first year as a classroom teacher.

Her decision to pursue education was strongly influenced by a teacher who made a lasting impression on her during high school.

"Miss Lindsay was a big inspiration for me," Robles said. "Whenever I was in high school, she really helped guide me to the right path and always ensured that I was successful. I want to do the same for other students."

Robles is no stranger to the community or school district. She student-taught at Protection Elementary/Middle School last fall, giving her an opportunity to become familiar with the students and community before beginning her teaching career.

Her connection to the area is one of the reasons she chose to return.

"I love Protection. I love this county. I love everything about it," Robles said. "People are so helpful and they never hesitate to lend a hand. You just can't find that anywhere else."

As she begins her first year, Robles said she is looking forward to more than just what happens inside the classroom. She is especially excited about attending football and basketball games and experiencing the community support surrounding the students.

"I love the sporting events because you really get to see everybody come together as a community to support our students," she said.

While English may not be every student's favorite subject, Robles hopes her students leave her classroom with a lesson that extends beyond writing and literature.

She wants students to learn how to tackle difficult things, even when they don't necessarily want to do them.

"There's a lot of people that don't like English, that don't like writing," Robles said. "But learning how to do the hard things even when you don't want to do them" is an important lesson for life.

Robles said students may also be surprised to learn just how young their new English teacher is. Outside of school, one of her interests is music; she used to play guitar.

As for her first-year teaching goal, Robles offered a response that came with a laugh: "Survive."

More seriously, she said she hopes to encourage students to be comfortable with who they are and not feel pressured to follow the crowd.

"Just be yourself," Robles said. "Don't be afraid to go against the grain."

For Robles, her first year in the classroom represents the beginning of an opportunity to become the kind of teacher she once needed herself – one who helps students find their path and succeed along the way.
