Silly Goose Childcare Opens Its Doors in Protection

Protection now has a daycare facility. Opening day was Monday, Aug. 17. The public has the opportunity to meet Isabella “Bella” Cervantes and tour Silly Goose Childcare on Saturday, Aug. 29, from 1 to 3 p.m., with punch and cookies served. Then, during the evening from 6 p.m. to midnight, the Silly Goose will be open if anyone needs a babysitter while attending Funfest activities. Miss Bella will have extra helpers there to help her care for the children.

Daily Schedule
Silly Goose Childcare opens at 7 a.m., with morning snack at 8:30 and circle time at 9. Learning centers start at 9:30, before outdoor play begins at 10:15. A group activity takes place at 11 before lunch time begins at 11:30. Nap and rest time begins at noon with an afternoon snack at 2 p.m. Enrichment hour gets underway at 2:30, before heading back outdoors 3:30. Story and reflection time begins at 4:15, with clean-up and pick-up taking place from 5-5:30 p.m. On Thursdays, the group will be in

the Protection Township Library from 3 to 4 p.m. for storytime and playtime. The licensed daycare permits Cervantes to have up to 10 children at a time. If more than 10, there has to be another adult added. A baby under 12 months counts as two. To contact Bella, call (620) 419-5261. Her hours at the Silly Goose are Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. You can also leave a message on Facebook at Silly Goose Childcare.

Daycare Needed
The daycare in Protection is a reality, thanks to the efforts of Jonathan and Mikaela Webster, of Protection, along with the Comanche County Economic Development Foundation. Websters purchased the steel building from Cale and Rachel Willems several years ago when Rachel decided to move her clothing and accessories business, Speckles & Stripes, to Dodge City. Rumors spread around town that the Websters planned to install a laundromat, along with fixing up the carwash facility, located south of the building. Changes that Jonathan has made to the carwash include equipment repairs/maintenance, sign replacements and an added credit/debit card reader option while still accepting quarters. In the meantime, he and his wife attended meetings that the CCEDF was holding in Wilmore, Coldwater and Protection to address many community concerns with housing development, job conservation/growth and community wellness. A daycare center in Protection was at the top of the list, along with housing. Both interested the Websters and the opportunity was there to follow up on both suggestions. A grant from CCEDF helped remodel the Webster building. A new floor plan included construction of walls, laminated flooring, wiring, lighting, plumbing and painting. Men were hired to begin the remodeling, but the Websters ended up finishing the project so there would be no more delays in getting Silly Goose Childcare open. The grant helped with furnishings including the television, kid-friendly toys, books and supplies. The Silly Goose Childcare also received donated items. The Websters leased the building to the city of Protection, and the city subleased the building to the daycare

M.M. Cosby and family attended the old soldiers’ reunion at Dodge City last week.

A number of people in this locality heard a noise one day last week which sounded very much like a distant explosion. It was supposed to be some kind of an explosive used at the Dodge City reunion.

The Rev. J.C. Fisher preached a splendid sermon Sunday night on the subject of temperance. His arguments in favor of temperance and morality were practical, forcible and convincing. Such sermons are calculated to do much good in our community. — [Correspondent] “JUNIPER.”

Superintendent is legal

Ashcraft in nationals

John Ashcraft, Protection’s famous daredevil flyer who is known over the flying world and to others of the U.S. as “Big Jack” Ashcraft, will enter the National Air Races to be held at Philadelphia the first week in September.

John is a son of J.W. Ashcraft and wife of Protection and received his schooling at the public schools of this city.

During the World War, he was a [motorcycle] dispatch bearer overseas. After returning home to Protection, he went to Texarkana, Texas, where he had a position in Bouden’s Exchange. Being a tinker with machines and in the mechanical departments of auto companies, he was soon made master mechanic in the care of airplanes.

While in the service of Uncle Sam, John received some training in the flying game and with this knowledge of the air, he soon developed into a stunt flier at the Kelly Fields near San Antonio, Texas.

About two years ago, he became a member of the Gates Flying Circus, which was then headquartered at New Orleans.

He had been with the circus only a short time when he was made pilot for the daredevil wing walkers and stunt performers on the planes. Later he began to be noticed in the flying world as a stunt flyer and gained much distinction wherever he performed for the thousands of interested spectators.

Owing to his height, build

and muscles, he was nicknamed “Big Jack.” It takes muscular development to steer a plane while another man is dangling in the air below it.

Jack is known to his eastern friends as the “Texas Cowboy.” He is 6 feet and 2 inches in height.

He piloted a plane at the New York Air Races, when Diavalo Krantz, America’s most thrilling entertainer of the air, did his “stuff” for the thousands of onlookers. John gained favorable mention from all the New York newspapers for his wonderful ability in handling the big plane.

Ashcraft got his first mention in the papers, and really was first noticed as a flyer of daring ability, when he piloted his machine around Stone Mountain in the South. He is the only flier who has been able to master the air around and over this mountain.

John won the Trenton Times Flying Trophy, which is a big silver cup and was given during the exhibition of the circus at Trenton, New Jersey. He won this cup as the result of the judges’ decision, who said that he did the most daring and greatest stunt flying of the day.

He holds the world’s record for the most consecutive loops in a thousand feet. He flew his plane to an altitude of 15,000 feet and did 15 loops with only a drop of 1,000 feet.

John has mastered the barrel roll, loop-the-loop, nose dive, falling leaf, tail-spin, Illerman turn, etc.

At the National Air Races this month, “Big Jack” will meet some of the best fliers in the country, as there will be over 600 planes in competition for the big prizes.

Jack Ashcraft was killed in an airplane crash in New York state in 1929. He had come to Protection as a 12-year-old-boy when his family moved here from Oklahoma. His father, John Sr., ran a hardware store. Two of his sisters, Mrs. John (Lillian) Webb and Mrs. Bill (Helen) Schultz, lived out their lives in Protection.

Ashcraft and some of his other family members are buried in the Protection cemetery. His name on his tombstone (supplied by the Veterans Administration) is misspelled as “Ashcroft.”

Cindy Weigand, Ashcraft’s grandniece, has written a novelized biography about her great-uncle, Big Jack: Cowboy Aviator. It’s available at the Protection Township Library.

Hit in the Ozark hills

While Walter Teter and family were en route to the Ozarks and were advancing up a long slope near Springfield, their Ford refused to make the grade.

The older boys of the family jumped out to assist, and while they were on the ground, little [six-year-old] Gerald proceeded to render assistance also and got out unnoticed.

A large car came over the hill from the opposite direction and hit Gerald, knocking him to the ground and rendering him unconscious for several hours.

He was rushed to the home of Samuel Hughes, an old friend of the Teters, where medical aid was given.

For several days he was in a serious condition. He was bruised and cut about the head badly. However, the POST is glad to say that Gerald is improving nicely

and will be able to be home in a few more days.

Traveling turtles

Fifty-eight dozen racing terrapins have been shipped to every part of the United States by John Webb, who lives east of Protection.

John says that some of these wild animals are so fast that he had to borrow a race horse from a neighbor and then had difficulty trying to lasso the swift specimens.

Dead ants

In a few weeks the streets and alleys of Protection will be rid of red ants which have been and are such a detriment to the inhabitants of the city.

The City entered into an agreement with R.E. Salyer, the ant killer, to do away with all ants in the streets and alleys. The city is to pay for all nests killed in the streets and alleys, but the property owners will pay for the hills on parkings and adjoining property.

New at the schoolhouse

The Protection Consolidated Schools will open Monday, September 3, for the 1951–52 school year.

The teaching faculty is complete. There will be four new teachers this year.

Edith Carter of Moline, Kansas, will teach the second grade. Bernice Anderson of Arkansas City will teach the sixth grade.

New teachers in high school will be Chester Hayden, coach, from Stafford, and Russell Duer, mathematics and science, from Alton, Kansas.

Miss Carter will reside at the Julia Foster home and Miss Anderson will live at the Taylor Apartments. Chester and Lora Hayden will live in the new residence being built by Mrs. Clara English. Russell and Janie Duer and daughter Cynthia have moved into the Dorothy Percifield residence.

Many improvements have been made this summer in preparation for the coming school year. The old grade school building (below) has been removed and the old site has been added to the playground area.



A concrete loading dock for the school busses has been built east of the grade school building. Sidewalks have been built east and west of the buildings for the outside traffic between high school and grade school.

The grade school lawn has been planted to velvet grass and is already making a good showing.

The decoration and lighting work on the high school building has been continued. This summer the upper and lower corridors have been decorated and florescent lighting has been installed in the band room and the home economics room.

The floors and desks in study hall and two of the classrooms have been resurfaced and finished.

A woven wire fence has been installed on the north property line, and Purl Bean

has built an attractive picket fence on the line adjoining his property.

The bus drivers for this year are J.D. Rowland, A.L. Vincent, George Teter, Gerald Teter, Allen Jantzen, Paul Edmonston and Robert Graham.

The custodians are George Percifield* for the high school and J.W. Sigars for the grade school.

The school lunch will again be in charge of Hester Hopkins. Her assistants will be May Sanders, Lois Harvey and Tressie Atteberry. **George Percifield worked as a custodian at the Protection school from 1949 until he retired in 1972.*

Two old-timers pass

William Winfred Kimes, former Protection resident, died at his home in Dodge City last Friday, August 17. He was 70 years old. He was born November 10, 1880, at Pollock, Missouri.

William and Maude Kimes came to Kansas in 1907 and farmed near Coldwater for three years. They lived at Protection for five years, after which they homesteaded in Meade County....

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Hulpieu-Swaim chapel in Dodge City. Burial was in the Protection cemetery at 4:30 p.m.

Funeral services for John Ezra Decker,* former Protection resident, will be held in the Christian Church this afternoon at 2 p.m. Reverend Ball of Ashland will officiate.

Mr. Decker succumbed in California. His body arrived in Dodge City Thursday evening and was brought to Protection by Peacock Mortuary.

**J.E. Decker moved to Protection from Oklahoma in 1914 and remained here much of his life. For several years he operated a dray wagon, hauling freight from the railroad depot to customers around town. He later farmed.*

After his first wife, Maud Ella Van Buren, died in 1921, he married Viola Tobias in 1926. She died in 1944. He had lived with his son George in California for a few months when he died.

Wade Harmon retires

This Saturday — August 31, 1991— will be “just another day” for him, says general manager Wade Harmon of Protection Co-op. He will be on duty the full day.

Regardless of what he says, the day will be different for Harmon. It will wind up almost 42 years of him working at our co-op. . . .

His first day of work for the local co-op was December 4, 1949. He was hired as driver of the gas truck.

What was his pay back then in 1949? “My net paycheck every two weeks was \$77.77 [about \$1,092 today], and I was really glad to get it,” he laughed. . . .

Harmon turned 63 in April. He was born at Marshfield, Missouri, and lost both parents just a year apart. He was nine when his dad died. He then lived with his aunt and uncle, Ruth and Charley Scholle, in Pratt.

Wade was from a large family: six boys and three girls. He graduated from Pratt High School in 1946, and came to Protection that summer. “I worked on several farms in this area for a time. I also painted houses with Raleigh Maris.”

Wade drove the Co-op gas truck for several years. When the co-op built its elevator in Coldwater and opened it on June 1, 1954, Harmon then became manager of that elevator. . . .

In August of 1956, Wade became assistant manager of the overall Protection Co-op. The manager was then E.C. McGonigle, now deceased.

Wade followed McGonigle as general manager, taking the position on October 31, 1960. The new general manager for Protection Co-op will be Kendall Poland, from Ness City. He takes over on September 1. . . .

The biggest single year for Protection Co-op in total bushels of wheat [during Harmon’s tenure] was in 1990. The elevators here and in Coldwater took in a whopping 1,916,000 bushels of wheat during that harvest. . . .

3D Printing Could Help Kansans Without Tornado Shelters

As real estate prices continue to rise in Kansas, many people are turning to manufactured housing because they are less expensive to build, averaging about \$123,000 per home. About 4 percent of Kansans live in these modular homes.
Some officials see them as one solution to building more affordable housing. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has recently proposed rule changes to expand the definition of a manufactured home and encourage multi-story manufactured housing construction.
It’s also housing that can be overlooked. For example, many of these manufactured housing communities lack access to storm shelters. In Kansas, requirements vary by city for storm shelters at these communities. This can leave residents with no place to go when a storm approaches.
Reese Greenlee is an assistant professor of architecture at Kansas

State University. When he moved to Kansas, he said the lack of publicly available storm shelters in the state stuck out.
Greenlee said while more than 20 million people live in manufactured homes across the country, architects have sometimes ignored them. They might not devote time to building important resources, like storm shelters, in these communities because they’re often in out-of-the-way locations or are perceived as “cheap” housing.
“Unfortunately, manufactured housing has really been stigmatized culturally, and so architecture has kind of overlooked it,” he said. “That’s where my research starts, looking at them as a significant American housing landscape.”
Greenlee started working with Shelby Doyle, associate professor of architecture at Iowa State University, and researchers at Iowa State’s Computation and Construction Lab on a solution.
They are currently exploring whether shelters made from 3D-printed concrete bricks can be

effective for these communities.
Traditionally, storm shelters have a concrete shell surrounding a steel or a reinforced concrete structure. They can be expensive to build for something that might only be used once a year, or less.
But Greenlee is researching whether a shelter made from unreinforced concrete blocks can withstand tornado-force winds and be cost efficient. He said concrete alone is not used enough in structures like shelters.
“Let’s push this material as far as we can and see what can come out of it and hopefully contribute something to research that potentially could be used in the future,” Greenlee said.
In general, 3D-printed concrete has several advantages. It’s increasingly being used in construction for homes and businesses. There can be cost savings, with less waste and labor. And the concrete can be formed into many different shapes and sizes, unlike the square concrete block structures usually built.

That flexible shape is what gives hiss blocks their strength. These blocks are shaped more like repeating coils, which Greenlee said looks like strips of solid material running the height of the shelter.
“That geometry helps with deflecting impact debris,” Greenlee said. “In the direction that the material is being laid, there’s this interesting dynamic property that we’ll be testing through Federal Emergency Management Agency’s impact load testing for storm shelters.”
Since he’s currently in the research phase, Greenlee said he is still exploring whether the blocks will meet FEMA’s standards for tornado shelters. And it remains to be seen if this method is more cost efficient, he said.
“We’re excited about it, but we really need that physical hard data to start to understand the real potential,” Greenlee said.
However, some benefits are clear to Greenlee. The blocks can be manufactured off-site in a modular fashion. It’s the same

advantage manufactured housing has that makes it affordable.
Since the 3D-printed concrete structures can be made in a wide variety of shapes and sizes, they can also have several functions.
A storm shelter that doubles as a community or recreation center offers multiple benefits. These 3D-printed concrete blocks could build something that creates greater community bonds while also providing protection.
“Start to look at shelters as pieces of infrastructure or architecture that can double as something else,” Greenlee said. “The main kind of interest for us is a storm shelter that doesn’t have to just exist as a bunker its whole life.”
Greenlee hopes additional research and development could help reduce the stigma of manufactured construction.
“I would love for the manufactured housing just to be more understood as a great and deeply affordable housing stock that we have available in the U.S.,” he said.

130 YEARS AGO

From Aug. 29, 1896 Star

Cooler weather is welcomed by everybody.

The atmosphere has been full of haze the past few days, obscuring the sun from shining so brightly.

From a political standpoint the STAR seems to be giving fairly good satisfaction. The thought of starting a republican paper has only been mentioned to us once this campaign.

The [Republican Chester I.] Long and [Populist Jerry] Simpson congressional debates will not begin until Sept. 14. They will both speak in this city prior to that date, consequently they will not debate in this city.

The Hon. Jerry Simpson [from Medicine Lodge] will speak in this city at 2 o'clock next Monday, Aug. 31.

At the close of his address the privilege of asking questions will be accorded to any one. Mr. Simpson's speeches have always been greeted with large crowds in the past, and next Monday will be no exception to the rule.

John Poltera has cleaned out the school house well and repaired the pump, by order of the school board.

Parents throughout the county wishing to send their children to a good school cannot do better than sending them to Coldwater, where they will receive all the advantages as in many of the more experienced schools.

Board can be secured very cheap, and the tuition is only \$1 [about \$39.75 in today's dollars] per month.

A change has been made in the affairs of the Chicago Lumber Co.'s yard, in this city. H.J. Williamson, who has been manager of the yard for several years, has purchased the company's interest and in the future will be owner and manager.

120 YEARS AGO

From Aug. 24, 1906 Star

Some warm weather this week.

A number of the public schools, including the Coldwater schools, will open in one week from next Monday, September 3.

The Coldwater baseball team went to Protection last Saturday afternoon and played the Protection team in an interesting game. Score, 4 to 0 in favor of Protection.

Atlee Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Smith of this county, now has the regular run as brakeman on one of the passenger trains on the Englewood branch. He has won his promotion by honest, faithful work.

Henry Stanley, who for several months had been working in the *Talisman* office in this city, began work on Wednesday morning in the STAR office. He is a capable and reliable printer.

Judge E.H. Madison will be in Coldwater on Tuesday, September 4, to hold an adjourned term of district court. It has been planned to have him make a political speech at the court house on that evening. The judge is the Republican nominee for Congress in this district. His many friends in this county will be glad to hear him express his opinion on the political issues of the day. Plan to be present and hear him.

A mass convention of the Republicans of Comanche-co. will be held in Coldwater at 2 p.m. on Saturday, September 1, 1906, for the purpose of nominating a

county ticket and a candidate for representative.

Henry Sohns started east on Tuesday to again take up his work with a traveling theatrical company.

110 YEARS AGO

From Aug. 25, 1916 Star

The first of this week there was a decided change toward cooler weather and a more complete breaking of the long dry spell.

Good rains fell over a large portion of this county, and although the precipitation was not all that was needed, it did much good and was gladly welcomed. It was at least enough to settle the dust good and cool the air.

In places, notably in the western and southern parts of the county, the rainfall was sufficient to quite thoroughly moisten at least the surface of the ground. More general rains are yet needed, but we certainly have a start in that direction.

Jack Loyd broke jail in this city on Monday afternoon and has not yet been apprehended. He was serving a jail sentence for stealing an automobile from R. Sibbitt of Protection, or, rather, awaiting trial in the district court.

We doubt if there is another town in southwestern Kansas in which more substantial and beautiful homes have been built during the past few years than there has been in Coldwater. A number of these new improvements have already been shown in the STAR.

The home of H.N. Marshall, manager of the Farmers Elevator Co. is a fine example. His residence was built during the past year and is a model of neatness and of convenience in arrangement. It contains eight rooms, with pantry and basement, and is supplied with water and light from the city plant. The cost was about \$3,000 [nearly \$92,000 now].

100 YEARS AGO

From Aug. 27, 1926 Star

The STAR has received many compliments on the manner in which it has given publicity to the county fair and the premium list and other facts pertaining to the fair, all of which help materially in informing the people and in securing a good attendance during each day of the fair.

A big, free barbecue will be a feature of the opening day of the county fair on Wednesday of next week. Horse races on Thursday and Friday will be the main attractions. There will be other means of amusement and entertainment.

The STAR has unexcelled means of securing the important news each week from all parts of the county, and we are striving to make our news service even more complete. We appreciate the splendid cooperation which our friends are giving us in our efforts to make the STAR a representative newspaper—one which will be welcomed each week by each reader.

Circus day, next Tuesday, McCay Field. Get up early, boys, and see the big circus unload from their train.

They have three camels, five elephants, 14 lions, 12 tigers, a cage of panthers, a cage full of snakes, 4 zebras, 100 horses, 20 clowns and three bands. Heritage Brothers circus at Coldwater Tuesday, August 31.

The Coldwater schools will begin Monday morn-

ing, September 6. The high school will open at 8:50 o'clock and the grade schools at 9:00 o'clock.

Monday will be used for the completion of registration, giving the pupils lists of books and other needed supplies, and the making of assignments. Regular school work will begin Tuesday morning in both the grades and high school.

We are looking forward to a great school year, and have great hopes for Coldwater's scholastic future, and are asking for the same community support that was given last year, then a good school is assured.

It is hoped that the entire corps of teachers will each prove to be especially well qualified for his or her work, and that the 1926-27 term of school in the Coldwater district, will be the most successful in the history of the school. In order that it be so, the cooperation of teachers, pupils and patrons alike is necessary. Let us all resolve to do our part in helping to bring about that result.

90 YEARS AGO

From Aug. 28, 1936 Star

Coldwater's Troop 171 Boy Scouts swam their way to a district championship in the Southwest Kansas Council Scout Swim Carnival at the municipal pool at Great Bend last Friday, nosing out stiff competition from throughout the southwestern part of the state to capture first honors in three events and third in two for a total of 19 points.

The carnival, described by Boy Scout officials as one of the biggest ever held in this part of the state, drew entrants from more than a score of southwest Kansas counties. It was estimated that approximately 180 scouts were registered to take active parts in the various events.

The scouts, primed for the big event by weeks of intensive training, were enthusiastic throughout the afternoon and evening and drew strong applause from fans with their wholehearted efforts to win.

The Swim Carnival was sponsored by the Great Bend Chamber of Commerce, civic organizations and individuals. Beginning at 2:15 o'clock in the afternoon it continued until after 10 o'clock last Friday night when the fire, dive, the closing event, was staged. The 1936-37 term of school will open on Monday morning September 7th, with the entire high school gathering in a general assembly at 9 o'clock.

All high school students are urged to enroll before school opens. The date of enrollment for the Seniors is Friday August 28, from 9 to 12 o'clock, for the Juniors, Friday August 28 from 1 to 4 o'clock. The Sophomores and Freshmen may enroll any time Saturday August 29.

There has been a great deal of work done on the building and grounds this summer so as to have everything in first class condition for the opening of school. First faculty meeting, 9 a.m. Friday, September 4th.

Mothers planning to enroll their children in Kindergarten, please do so by September 3, so that equipment and supplies can be obtained. Call or see Mrs. Meador.

On last Saturday afternoon a good shower fell over Coldwater and a few other parts of the county. It cooled

the air for a short time, but by Sunday afternoon it was very warm again, and has continued so ever since.

On Tuesday the temperature reached 109 degrees, and on Wednesday it was the same. We are still waiting and hoping for a good general rain.

80 YEARS AGO

From Aug. 30, 1946 Star

On Thursday of last week Coldwater's baseball team journeyed to Greensburg and played the Greensburg nine as a part of the attractions at their fair.

Coldwater won the game by a score of 5 to 1 with Fraser holding Greensburg to two hits, while Coldwater got 12 hits including a double hit by Lennis Herd. "Porky" made his first appearance at shortstop and did a good job. It is hoped that he will plug a big hole in the infield for the remainder of the season.

Coldwater plays Anthony Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock for our first tournament game. This promises to be a fast meet and it is hoped that Coldwater's team will receive much local support.

During the past 17 days it has rained during 10 of them, with a total moisture of 4.63 inches. However, none of the rains have been general. Some communities had only from one-half inch to an inch of rain.

During the past week, the weather in Comanche County has been cool and cloudy, and what the STAR's Intertype operator describes as an August blizzard occurred Wednesday night—the temperature got down to 53—20 degrees above freezing. Her teeth are still chattering.

A film of Coldwater people and scenes filmed a number of years ago, will be shown at the Coldwater theater September 11 and 12 and should be of unusual interest to our people.

70 YEARS AGO

From Aug. 31, 1956 Star

Sunday, September 2, is Youth Sunday at the Methodist church. The MYF will have charge of the morning service and Miss Merlyn McMinimy, who spent part of the summer in a work camp, will be the guest speaker.

Sunday evening is "Family Night." Supper at 7:00 o'clock. The youth will present the worship service and a picture, *Far from Alone*, will be shown. Do not miss these services.

The Coldwater schools will start the 1956-57 term Tuesday morning of next week with a full complement of teachers. The high school enrollment was completed August 23 and 24.

Football practice will start Saturday, September 1, with about 40 boys lining up for the initial practice sessions. The first football game of the season is to be held at Kiowa on September 21, a non-league game.

The Comanche County Council of Clubs announce that they will hold a school book exchange in the Coldwater school gymnasium on September 1 and on the 4th from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. for the convenience of school patrons and pupils. Keep the dates in mind.

Practically all places of business in Coldwater with the possible exception of some of the cafes and filling stations, who serve the traveling public, plan to close all day on Monday, Labor Day.

So, by Saturday night, buy your groceries and supplies to last until Tuesday morning.

Mr. and Mrs. Toby Coles, who own and operate the Northside Market in Coldwater, are convinced that some tourists who happened to stop at their store are among the very honest kind.

They bought some things for a lunch recently and wanted to know where there was a roadside park to rest and lunch. The Coles directed them to the very up-to-date roadside park south of Coldwater and the tourists left on their way to their home in Arkansas.

In about an hour, they returned to the store, though it meant turning back from their road home, and brought back a carton of gum that had gotten into their package by mistake.

60 YEARS AGO

From Aug. 25, 1966 Star

School days are almost here.

High school enrollment will be Friday, August 26, with Freshmen and Sophomores enrolling from 8 a.m. until noon and Juniors and Seniors enrolling from 1 p.m. until 4.

The first full day of school will be Monday, August 29, 1966, and school lunch will be served. Buses will pick up rural students in the morning and return them in the afternoon. School lunch tickets may be purchased in the office.

There will be no school on Labor Day, Monday, September 5.

Enrollment for grades Kindergarten through six will be on Monday, August 29. There will be a full day of school for all students except the Kindergarten. The Kindergarten will meet in the morning.

Eighth grade students may pick up their enrollment cards Friday, August 26, between 10 a.m. and 12 noon. All seventh grade students are asked to meet with the teachers at 1 p.m. on Friday, August 26.

All students should bring money for textbook rentals and lunch tickets when they enroll. Money for enrolling students in grades Kindergarten through six should be sent on Monday, the first day of school. Grade and high school will be dismissed at 2:30 Monday, the first day of school.

The Northwest Law Enforcement Conference Association will hold its regular monthly meeting in the Comanche Restaurant Wednesday, September 7, 1966. Peace officers from northwest Oklahoma, Texas, southcentral and southwest

Kansas will be in attendance.

Sheriff Peterson states that he feels honored to have this meeting held in Coldwater. There has been only one previous meeting of the Association held in Kansas. Prominent speakers from KBI and FBI are on the agenda for the afternoon program following a luncheon at noon.

50 YEARS AGO

From Aug. 26, 1976 Star

Advance gate admission tickets for the 1976 Kansas State Fair can be purchased at the ticket office in the administration building on the fairgrounds here beginning Monday, August 16.

Advance gate tickets are also available at participating IGA stores throughout central and western Kansas. The discount will be available at IGA through the fair.

Again this year, there will be no general admission charge to the grandstand shows. Fair goers can see such top name entertainers as Roy Clark, Bobby Goldsboro, Tanya Tucker, Ray Stevens, Shari Lewis, Anita Bryant, Woody Herman, Freddy Fender, as well as rodeo and racing action, just for the price of the outside gate ticket.

However, a limited number of reserved grandstand seats are available for each performance. Priced at \$4 and \$2 [\$23.30 and \$11.75 now] depending on location, they can be purchased at the fair ticket office.

The Coldwater softball season started back in April with the team traveling to Hazelton for a weekend tournament. The makeshift ball team did well enough to bring home the fourth place trophy. Coldwater kept on playing ball in May and June with ballgames two nights a week. Coldwater won more than its share of wins against all of the teams.

In the month of July, Coldwater played in a tournament three consecutive weekends. Coldwater played three games on the final day to finish second in this eight team tourney. Kansans Dubious of Trump's Beef Strategy

Kansas ranchers and their representatives in the U.S. Senate responded with skepticism to President Donald Trump's plan to ease tariffs on beef imports for 90 days in an attempt to moderate domestic grocery prices through the midterm election in November. Glenn Brunkow, president of the Kansas Farm Bureau, warned that the president's manipulation of the market by temporarily surging beef imports could be harmful to farmers and consumers. “President Trump's call to sell foreign beef below market prices is bad for consumers, destructive for ranchers and anti-American in principle,” said Brunkow, a fifth-generation Pottawatomie County farmer producing crops and livestock. “The answer to increasing prices in grocery stores isn't selling out American farmers and ranchers to buy votes in November.” He said the president should support U.S. cattle producers in ways that gradually expanded the domestic herd so supply of this staple of the American diet would better match demand.
