Coldwater news from earlier days

130 YEARS AGO *From Sept. 5, 1896 Star*

The small boy is getting all the fun out of life he can this week, for on next week his freedom will be curtailed by the commencement of school.

A cold wave will come sweeping down shortly and remind the people of their wasted summer's wages.

The town was very quiet Wednesday. It was enough to make a newspaper man weep to walk up and down the street looking for local news.

There has been no rain in this locality for more than a month, and consequently all vegetation is drying up to a considerable extent. Fruits and vegetables that have not matured are a disappointment. The late peach crop will almost be a failure. The range grass is as dry as a bone, except in the bottoms and low lands. The roads are dusty, and there is no telling when there will be a change.

T.J. Brown has opened up a livery and feed stable in the Parker Wright barn.

The prospects of having free-coinage next year is causing new business enterprises to spring up in our county. Mr. Brown may call it the "Free Silver Barn."

The Coldwater Graded Schools will open next Monday, September 7, under an able corps of teachers, and it is requested that all pupils be on hand promptly, so they can be assigned to their respective rooms and classes on the first day of the school.

The School Board has made an order that all non-resident pupils who expect to attend our schools, must pay a tuition fee of \$1.00 per month [almost \$40 in today's dollars] in advance, which will be the actual cost to the district for each pupil.

120 YEARS AGO *From Aug. 31, 1906 Star*

Another good rain last night. Some cooler weather this week.

The fall term of the Coldwater public schools will open on next Monday, September 3, at 9 a.m.

Senator Chester I. Long is making an automobile campaign tour of this part of the state and is billed to speak in Coldwater at 2 o'clock p.m. on Monday, September 17.

W.J. Fitzgerald, Republican candidate for lieutenant governor, and C.E. Denton, candidate for secretary of state, will accompany the senator.

A grand reunion of the old and new settlers of Comanche and adjoining counties will be held at Helbert's ranch on Mule Creek, two miles southeast of Wilmore, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, September 20, 21, and 22, 1906.

110 YEARS AGO *From Sept. 1, 1916 Star*

School will open at 9 o'clock Monday morning, September 4, at which time pupils in the grades will be enrolled. High school pupils are requested to enroll on Saturday, the 2nd. High school pupils are requested to purchase their books on Saturday, immediately after they are enrolled. Grade children should not purchase their books until after they are enrolled on Monday, the 4th.

Not much has been printed during the past few weeks in regard to the forthcoming County Fair to be held in this city on September 27, 28 and 29, for the reason,

principally, that everybody has been very busy with harvest, threshing, plowing and other matters, but during the past week the committees have "got very busy" again, with the result that definite plans for the Fair have practically been agreed upon, so that now there is every assurance that the Fair will be a success.

At a meeting held at Thornton & Arnold's office on Tuesday evening the entire preliminary plans were gone over and finally agreed upon. Plans were agreed upon for the construction of some needed improvements at the fair grounds, just east of town. The premium list, including the race program, was revised and completed. The list will be printed next week. Two new committees were appointed.

Among the amusement features at the Fair will be a number of races by Comanche-co. horses and motorcycles, a merry-go-round, a good theatrical performance each evening, many minor amusements, etc.

On account of its rapidly increasing business, the Coldwater Telephone Co. has, since June 1, employed three day operators—Miss Elsie Holbert, Miss Mary Meers and Mrs. Frank Meers. Miss Mattie McWherter is the night operator. During the illness of Raymond Hoff, Ray McIntire of Sharon is doing the line work.

100 YEARS AGO *From Sept. 3, 1926 Star*

Work on Kansas Highway No. 1 (on the five-mile stretch from Coldwater southward) is progressing rapidly. It looks as though the road work is being well done and that, when completed, there should be a permanency about it. Eventually, the entire stretch of this north-and-south road in this county will be competed in like manner. It will then be an ideal road to travel over. Kansas Highway No. 1 is known as the Albert Pike Highway in this county.

Turtle and terrapin stunts seem to be the latest attraction at fairs, rodeos and other gatherings. Some folks are making "good money" capturing terrapins and selling them for exhibition purposes, it is said.

The WESTERN STAR is distinctly a county paper, since it gives each week the important news from almost every neighborhood in the county. That, we believe, is one reason why the people want the STAR. It seems that rodeos have become the rage all over the country. About every county in Kansas, Oklahoma and Colorado is putting on some kind of an attraction in the way of a rodeo.

90 YEARS AGO *From Sept. 4, 1936 Star*

Preparations are complete for the opening of our schools next Monday, September 7. One hundred ninety-one students have enrolled in the high school for the term. Several students are out of town, who will enroll later, and will thus run the enrollment over the 200 mark.

The freshman class has the largest enrollment, with

a total of 54, the juniors are second with 48, the seniors next, with 45, and the sophomores have 43 enrolled. One post-graduate has enrolled to date.

The grade school pupils will go to their rooms for enrollment Monday morning at 9 o'clock, while the high school pupils will meet in the auditorium for a general assembly, after which short class periods will be held.

Dr. Norla Scott has moved her office from the Wright residence property to rooms over the Burton Drug store.

An increase fatalities because of collisions between cars and between cars and bicycles, and accidents in which cars ran into ditches or skidded boosted the number of traffic deaths by 17 during the first five months of 1936 over the same period the year before.

Exactly 218 people met death during the first five months of 1936, compared to 201 in the same months of 1935. This year there has been a decrease in deaths because of car train collisions, car-and-electric car collisions, and collisions with fixed objects such as bridges, culverts, and utility poles.

The number of pedestrians killed was the same both years, 56.

The 1936 rate of fatalities in Kansas is three people killed by automobiles every two days. Most of these unnecessary deaths are due, says the Kansas Safety Council, to people's reckless desire for speed and their lack of control over it.

**Since 1916 the Literary Digest poll had correctly predicted the winner of presidential elections—until 1936. Just before the election the magazine's poll showed Republican Alf Landon (Kansas governor at the time) would overwhelmingly defeat incumbent President Franklin Roosevelt with about 60% of the popular vote.*

Instead, Roosevelt received 61% of the vote, winning every state except Maine and Vermont. The Literary Digest went out of business two years later.

80 YEARS AGO *From Sept. 6, 1946 Star*

Cool weather the past week. Why go to Colorado?

The Coldwater baseball team entered the Medicine Lodge tournament and won their first game from the highly touted Anthony team Monday afternoon by a score of 10 to 6.

Coldwater, Cunningham and Medicine Lodge remained in the running up to Wednesday. Wednesday evening Coldwater lost to the Cunningham nine 10 to 2 and had to play a second game that night losing it to Anthony 20 to 9.

The Coldwater schools, which opened on Monday of this week, had an enrollment on Wednesday of 342 pupils. This is an increase over last year to all grades except the fifth and sixth grades, Supt. T.L. Lindsey reports.

Donald Nicholas, son of Mr. and Mrs. W.G. Nicholas of this city, has a very interesting exhibit this week in one of the J.C. Penney Co. windows, displaying some of his oil and watercolor paintings. Stop by and see

Last Monday morning at 8:45, 14 planes which were on a goodwill tour sponsored by the Liberal Junior Chamber of Commerce arrived at the Stark airport adjoining Coldwater and made a 30-minute visit here. They were greeted by city officials and the Coldwater Lions Club and were advertising a four-day race meet to be held September 11–14.

70 YEARS AGO *From Sept. 7, 1956 Star*

The Bucks and Does Square Dance Club of this city is sponsoring a square dance Saturday evening, September 8, starting at 8 o'clock. The dance will be held on the lighted concrete tennis court at the Coldwater school athletic field. The public is invited to attend.

One evening last week, shortly before retiring, Mrs. David Cary, who lives with her family in the old Bert Griffith place just south of Coldwater, heard their puppy outside the house yelping loudly as if in distress.

Mrs. Cary turned on the yard light and found that a half-grown skunk had a firm hold on the pup's upper lip and would not let go.

Theo, as she is known to her many friends, grabbed a broom and beat the skunk with the handle but with no results. Not knowing what else to do, she grabbed the skunk around the neck with both hands until the skunk was choked to death and the beloved puppy was released from danger.

Yes, you guessed. Theo washed her hair several times, buried her clothes and took several baths all on account of her love for a mighty cute little doggie.

60 YEARS AGO *From Sept. 1, 1966 Star*

This will be a first for the Coldwater area. A Fellowship of Christian Athletes in the high school of Coldwater at 2 p.m. September 11. Rev. Ed Beck, a former all-American player of the Kentucky University basketball teams will be the guest speaker.

All schools of the Iroquois League plus the rest of our school's opponents have been invited to attend. Our local coaches plus the boys who make up our FCA group will be sharing in this rally of their recent experiences at Estes Park, Colo.

Edward Jackson, Coldwater, has been awarded a Sears Roebuck Foundation scholarship to attend Kansas State University, Manhattan, this coming year. Jackson, the son of Neill and Betty Jackson, will enroll in the College of Agriculture.

The Sears Roebuck Foundation scholarships were awarded to outstanding high school graduating seniors who have good academic records and a sincere interest in agriculture or home economics.

Jackson was active in athletics, Student Council, National Honor Society and band of Coldwater

high school. He was also a delegate to Boys' State and a member of 4-H and MYF.

The football squad of Coldwater High School enjoyed the first of several cuts of luscious water-melons—an annual affair sponsored by the Coldwater Lions Club. A Downtown Quarterback Club is being considered to help back the Eagles this coming season.

The rain Monday morning brought moisture as much as three inches in some places. Nig Atteberry reported two and a half to three at his place; Jimmy Hazen had two and one-half; Wood Beeley, .40; Horace Parker about three; Don York reported .20 at his place east of Coldwater and two and one-half inches on the highway where his aunts, Maude and Stella, live. So the amounts were pretty scattered.

Out here we may not be ready for a downpour, but like some fellow said, we take it when it comes. The cool weather we've had recently is a welcome change.

50 YEARS AGO *From Sept 2, 1976 Star*

Enrollment in the attendance centers of USD 300 appears to be complete. The total full-time equivalent enrollment is 522.5. This compares with 521.5 on September 15, 1975, and 531.5 on September 15, 1974. Total head count is 542. Coldwater Grade School, 193; Protection Grade School 154; Coldwater High School 109; Protection High School 86.

Student population would seem to have stabilized. Many schools in the area are still losing enrollment, some as much as eight to ten percent per year. We are very fortunate to have reached a level of stability.

The Coldwater post office was moved last week across the street east and a half block farther to the new location just east of Vance's Tax Accounting and business offices. It is just west of Rogers Econo-Wash on the south side of Main Street.

The exterior is finished with buff brick and the wooden front is painted a rich chocolate brown. The windows and door are smoked glass. A sturdy flagpole stands out in front.

Postmaster Virgil McIntyre reports he likes the new quarters very much. There is much more room, convenience of location, more boxes available, etc. Patrons are getting used to having to have a key to open the new style boxes. However, this is a great convenience to those who had difficulty seeing the old combination locks which were really difficult to open sometimes. It will take some getting used to as some keep forgetting their keys and can't see in the boxes unless they are open, but it is a nice change with definite advantages.

40 YEARS AGO *From Sept. 4, 1986 Star*

The Jr. Eagles football squad opened practice on Aug. 21, with 17 boys reporting. The weather has been cool and practice has been aided by this.

First game action will come this Tuesday, Sept. 9, at Haviland at 7. The opposition is a team composed of players from both Haviland and Mullinville.

The Jr. Eagles have only three lettermen returning from last year's team but the team hopes to improve on last year's three and three record. Six eighth graders will anchor the squad. There are also 11 seventh graders. The Jr. Eagles are coached by Rocky Stewart and Jay Goering.

Preliminary school figures show that Coldwater's enrollment is up slightly over last year while Protection's is down a little from a year ago.

As of Tuesday, Coldwater's enrollment stood at a total of 255 students, counting grade school, junior high and high school. That figure was 248 a year ago for a net increase of seven students.

A breakdown of the Coldwater enrollments shows an increase of three in the high school (80 last year and 83 this year). The grade school enrollment shows a gain of four (up from 133 a year ago to 137 now), while the junior high enrollment remains unchanged at 35 students.

Both principals, Coldwater's Sam Rawdon and Protection's John Garvie, reported to the board that the school year had started out "great" and students and staff were showing enthusiasm, as the new term begins. Noted by each principal was how well new staff members were working out.

As promised last week, the STAR's weather report has now taken on a new dimension and new look. But it's not done yet. This week we've added the precipitation readings from the Merrill Ranch as recorded by Phyllis Scherich. The annual total and year-to-date totals will remain that of Coldwater, however. Soon, we hope, another "change in the weather" will come about, but the equipment hasn't arrived yet.

Coldwater's slow-pitch softball squad for men won one game and lost two during the weekend in the annual Kiowa Invitational Tournament.

The big three-day meet attracted a rugged field of 12 squads, including a number from neighboring Oklahoma. It was a double-elimination and ran Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. On Saturday afternoon, Coldwater won its tournament opener. That was by 12–3 over the College Bums of Alva. That was a group of Northwestern Oklahoma State University students from Alva. The game was shortened to just five innings because of the runs-ahead rule.

Later that afternoon, Coldwater went against Molz Oil of Kiowa, one of the top clubs in that region. Kiowa posted a 10–6 decision over the locals.

That put Coldwater into the losers bracket of the double-elimination meet. On Sunday afternoon, Coldwater faced another Alva team: Kentucky Fried Chicken. The Oklahomans won a 7–5 thriller, sidelining Coldwater from further tourney play.

Nursing home on track

A couple of problems that have apparently been surmounted this past week, have cleared the way for Protection Manors [now Protection Valley Manor], a 60-bed home for the aged, and construction on the home should begin soon.

The two problems that have held up construction on the home have been the lack of an "OK" from the regional planning authority that must determine the feasibility of any such construction. This permission was given this week.

The other problem concerned a survey of the land on which Protection Manors will be built. Apparently, when the land on the south

edge of Protection was owned by E.G. Tharp, the state highway commission took some of the land to make the "Y" leading onto U.S. Highway 160.

The loss of this land apparently was never noted on the abstract and therefore, when the Sanders brothers sold the land to Retirement Homes, Inc., the abstract had to be brought up to date and the land area resurveyed so state requirements could be met. . . .

Capturing Classic Coldwater

ONE THE EARLIEST KNOWN PHOTOGRAPHS OF COLDWATER (below). The photographer apparently set up the camera at the main intersection in town—Central Avenue and Main Street. The date could be any time after November 1884, when Dr. J.E. Sombart built his drugstore. However, a close look at the two women on the porch of his business indicates they weren't wearing coats, so the earliest date might more likely be in 1885 during warm weather. Before a city water system was available in Coldwater in the Teens, the windmill in the photo no doubt served citizens who didn't have their own water well. The freight wagons shown perhaps went between Coldwater and Kinsley, because until the railroad arrived in Comanche County in the summer of 1887, nearly everything—dry goods, some food items, lumber and other building materials, coal, and so forth, was hauled into the county from the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad at Kinsley.

SCHROCK LUMBER COMPANY (below), built in Wilmore in 1911 by John Schrock, the great-grandfather of the author of this history page. His brother Harvey "Harve" Schrock managed the business for years, which later grew to include farm implement sales. John also built a lumberyard in Protection that he sold to the Houston-Doughty company. It stood on the location of Protection's current library. John and his wife Cora also farmed north of Protection for a time.

Timberwolves did a good job of matching the physicality.

Westrup said it was good to get a chance to “finally hit somebody else” after the Timberwolves have spent two weeks practicing against each other. He said that practices have gone well but it’s about fine-tuning things before the opener.

“You know, we just got to polish up on the little things,” Westrup said. “You know, we haven’t changed anything. We just got to get better on our combo blocks on offense and run better routes on the perimeter.

“And defensively, we got to do a better job of getting off blocks, really work on getting off blocks and making good tackles in the open field.”

He added that the weather has made things challenging, with temperatures above 100 at times and more expected this week.

The Timberwolves have had three morning practices already and Westrup expected to have more of those this week.

“We’re going to have to really focus because it’s going to be a shorter practice period,” he said. “And we’re just going to have to really focus on what we’re doing.

”A lot more, just a lot more install and we’re not going to be able to do a lot of individual drills. We’re going to have to get a lot out of our team time and just really focus.”

South Central and Meade opened the season against each other last year. The Timberwolves won 48-6, but Westrup said that the Buffaloes are bringing back a lot of players with a lot of size.

“We’re going to have to be physical up front,” he said. “We’re going to have to use our athleticism to get us in space.”

Westrup said that Meade is likely going to use a lot of

inside runs because of their size, then try to get some outside runs and, occasionally, try to isolate defenders on pass routes. When the Buffaloes do pass, Westrup said, the Timberwolves will need to sit in the right zone when running their zone coverage.

The Timberwolves are still solidifying their depth chart, as far as determining who will be the No. 1 and No. 2 option at certain positions, the head coach said. To that end, those players will get plenty of snaps so he and the staff can finalize those things.

Westrup added that he wants the Timberwolves to be physical and play smart.

“We want to go out and be very physical and just use our physicality to just shut somebody down and play tough, you know, take care of the ball,” he said. “We want to eliminate mental mistakes. We had a lot of those last year and we want to be better at taking care of the mental mistakes.”

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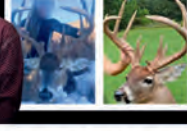
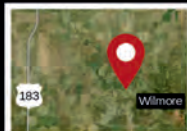
